

Rural Leaders Training Program

Located in Tochigi, Japan, Asian Rural Institute (ARI) trains grassroots rural leaders who live and work in their native communities, regardless of nationality, race, religious beliefs, gender, or age. The aim of the training is to facilitate the self-development of rural people, in order to build a more just and peaceful society.

The training is practically-oriented. Participants learn through classroom lectures, discussions and study tours, then put this learning into practice by managing their own fields and rice paddies, raising livestock, leading committees, and organizing

The ARI community is almost completely self-sufficient, with more than 90 percent of

ARI does not have an independent source of funds, but relies on the support of individuals, churches, and funding organizations to operate the training program. Furthermore, since ARI actively seeks out people from the most marginalized areas of the world, who have few resources to support themselves for this training, ARI helps them to connect with potential supporters for scholarship assistance. 


